
CBA Explores Ways to Involve Seniors in Pro Bono Work

On August 11, CBA Immediate Past President Charley Garcia welcomed senior lawyers to an exploratory meeting regarding the formation of a CBA program that would involve senior attorneys in *pro bono* work. Garcia underscored the CBA's priority of engaging senior lawyers during all phases of their transition from the daily practice of law. One of the fundamental points raised was the importance of identifying an unmet need that the new program would address.

Gary Lozow, who brought the concept of the program to the attention of CBA's leadership, emphasized that the program would provide senior lawyers ways to continue to apply their expertise and passions within the legal system. He cited the Colorado Supreme Court's Colorado Attorney Mentoring Program (CAMP) as one outlet through which senior lawyers can share their wisdom and expertise with younger generations. Representatives from other programs, including Colorado Legal Services, Disability Law Colorado, ACLU Colorado, Elder Watch, and the Colorado Juvenile Defender Center, expressed their willingness to work with senior lawyers and pair them with a type of work they would find appealing.

The meeting concluded with a summary of next steps. Based on levels of interest, a committee will be formed with the objective of further developing the vision, scope, and structure of the program. CBA Executive Director Patrick Flaherty noted that the logistics relating to malpractice insurance and staffing for the project are in the process of being finalized.
